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






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### **ISSR MUN UPDATED**

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




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# GLOBAL PERSPECTIVES PROJECT

My name is Aki Ra and I am the founder of this museum. I have been clearing and collecting weapons since the war in my country ended. I don't know what year I was born, but I'm told it was 1970. I was given my first gun at the age of ten, when I became a child soldier with the Khmer Rouge. I'm told that my parents were killed by the Khmer Rouge before I was five years old. I saw many of my friends die during the war as well as many civilians. It was normal to see such things as a soldier in Cambodia.

I used to lay landmines when I was a soldier. I laid thousands. I used to lay landmines when I was a soldier. I laid indusands, At the time I did not realize how terrible landmines were or how much pain they caused my people. From childhood to adulthood, all I knew was war. I grew up thinking that was normal. I was very good at using landmines and learned all about them as a soldier. Landmines were my friends because they could catch food for me. They would even

in 2009 from complications after a brief illness. We have three beautiful children named Amatak, Mine and Metha. My brother Yon is the Operations Manager at the Museum and my sister Von lives in Siem Reap.

Q: Why do you have a Japanese name?

A. I have had many names over the years. When I was a Khmer Rouge soldier i was called "Yeak" which means dirty giant. Another name given to me by a Khmer Rouge soldier was "Lo" which means to cry a lot. I got this name because

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














## **ISSR FIRE DRILL**

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### FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

The Ideal Number of IGCSE Subjects: Our School's Perspective. At our school, we believe that taking eight IGCSE subjects is the optimal choice for students. This recommendation is based on several key factors that contribute to a well-rounded and comprehensive education. We plan with teacher staffing based on subjects taken at the school and in a small school such as ours we are not able to provide supervision for students wishing to drop a subject.

#### Why Eight Subjects?

- 1. Balanced Curriculum: Taking eight subjects ensures that students receive a broad education, covering a wide range of disciplines. This balance helps in developing diverse skills and knowledge, which are crucial for future academic and career opportunities. Students often want to change their original thoughts about careers as they mature and wish that they had taken more subjects to develop a strong base.
- 2. University Requirements: Universities look for students who have a strong academic background across multiple subjects. By taking eight subjects, students can meet and exceed these expectations, making them more competitive applicants. Universities do advertise a minimum number of subjects. However, applicants with a wider base and more subjects than the minimum get more preference.
- 3. Skill Development: Each subject offers unique challenges and learning experiences. By engaging with a variety of subjects, students develop critical thinking, problem-solving, and analytical skills that are essential for success in higher education and beyond.
- 4. Flexibility and Choice: With eight subjects, students have the flexibility to explore different areas of interest. This can help them make more informed decisions about their future studies and career paths.



#### Addressing Personal Challenges

We understand that some students may face personal challenges that make it difficult to manage eight subjects. In such cases, focusing on seven subjects can be a viable option. However, it is important to consider the following:

- Resilience: Overcoming challenges and academic maintaining а strong despite difficulties performance is a testament to a student's resilience. This quality is highly valued by universities and employers alike.
- Dedication to Study Ethics: Dedication to one's studies, even in the face of adversity, reflects a strong work ethic. It shows that a student is committed to their education and willing to put in the effort required to succeed.

#### Conclusion

While our school recommends taking eight IGCSE subjects for a well-rounded education, we recognize that individual circumstances may necessitate a different approach. Students who choose to focus on seven subjects should do so with the understanding that resilience and dedication to their studies are key to their success. This choice may not be the best choice for you.
